


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EADRCC EXERCISE SITUATION REPORT N° 2 ON TERRORIST ATTACK IN ROMANIA

Exercise/Dacia 2003//

1. Update on the Situation in Romania

1.1. The EADRCC has received new information about the explosion mentioned in Situation Report No. 1 paragraph 1.1. The explosion that occurred in Pitesti at the Water pumping Station at 08:00 hrs local time yesterday has killed 4 people and injured 50. The Water Pumping Station is totally damaged by this explosion. This attack was also claimed by EMANON. Measurements indicate that a Radiological Dispersion Device (Dirty Bomb) was used and dose rates of several micro Sieverts/hour have been measured on large areas along the radioactive cloud passage.

1.2. International football teams and visitors are still in the area and therefore in danger of being affected. Local hospitals cannot provide treatment for this particular Radiological Dispersion Device (RDD) situation. A large number of injured people have been transported to a specialised hospital in Bucharest. In case the situation worsens, treatment of the casualties outside Romania will have to be considered. Most casualties have injuries which are typical for an explosion, however taken into consideration that RDD was used, external wounds are contaminated with Caesium 137, which aggravates the situation.

1.3. The following Romanian Boarder Crossing Points are recommended for the entrance of international assistance: West -Varsand, Turnu, Nadlac; East - Albita, Reni; South – Ruse; North – Halmeu; Otopeni International Airport. These BCPs have special customs arrangements and police and traffic measures have been taken to facilitate entrance of the international teams.
