

1. Situation update:

1.1 Recovery and response operations continue in the areas affected by Hurricane Katrina. A total of 81.376 US Federal personnel (which include US Coast Guard, National Guard, DOD, Federal Law Enforcement, and FEMA responders) remain deployed to support relief efforts. Public Health emergencies have been declared in 14 states; 16 states have Emergency Declarations, and another four states have Presidential Disaster Declarations. There are 607.655 electrical power customers in Louisiana and Mississippi still without power. This is down by over 2 million from a peak of 2.7 million customers who were without power after Hurricane Katrina struck the region. Hurricane Katrina fatalities are now over 320 and the number is expected to increase as recovery operations continue in each of the affected States. There are 197.287 evacuees residing in 553 shelters across 20 States. Evacuees are currently moving from shelters to temporary housing. The flow of commodities has stabilised throughout the affected states. Shelters and evacuation centers are providing food, water, ice and other life-sustaining services. FEMA and the American Red Cross (ARC) have coordinated a satisfactory daily meal plan, based on the use of commodities, for shelters (currently 320,000 meals per day) that will be re-evaluated every five days.

1.2 On Saturday, 10 September 2005, the USG accepted some of the offers of assistance by Czech Republic, Denmark, Luxembourg, Norway, Romania, Slovak Republic and Slovenia; on Monday, 12 September 2005, also the offers from Austria and Finland were accepted (accepted items are indicated in the tables in bold). Austria, Czech

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Republic, Denmark, Finland, Luxembourg, Slovak Republic and Slovenia indicated that they would use the NATO-offered movement system.

1.3 Also Bulgaria and Lithuania informed the EADRCC that, depending on the validation of their offers, they opt to utilise NATO-offered airlift capabilities.

1.4 In light of this and with reference to the North Atlantic Council's (NAC's) decision on 9 September to offer NATO lift assets to transport requested items from Allied and Partner nations to the United States, EAPC nations are invited to utilise this Alliance capability in order to expeditiously move the requested assistance to the United States.

1.5 SACEUR, through its SACEUR OPLAN 10304 for the Provision of NATO Support to the US in Response to Hurricane Katrina will assist all EAPC nations in co-ordinating the movement of urgently needed material in support of humanitarian relief operations. The SHAPE Allied Movement Co-ordination Centre (AMCC) co-ordinates national offers of airlift. In this capacity, the AMCC will liaise with appropriate US transportation entities such as US Transportation Command and the US's Response Management Team's Operations Center.

1.6 SHAPE Allied Movement Coordination Centre (AMCC) has designated Ramstein Airbase, Germany as the European hub for the NATO air-bridge. Nations may be requested by the EADRCC, on a case by case basis, to transport their accepted donations to the Ramstein AB for onward movement.

1.7 Interested nations should immediately contact the Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Co-ordination Centre (EADRCC) in order to request NATO airlift coordination. Nations who offered their assistance are requested to inform whether they will put their aid through the NATO-offered movement system.

1.8 If yes, nations are kindly requested to provide the following essential planning data by e-mail to the EADRCC:

- a. Nature of the item(s) to be shipped, e.g. tents, pumps, blankets etc...
- b. Weight in kilograms
- c. Volume in metric
- d. Dimensions in metric
- e. Type of packaging e.g. bales, rolls, boxes etc
- f. Whether palletised or not . If palletised , specify the type of pallet(s) e.g. Europallets or...etc.....
- g. If dangerous good e.g. HAZMAT etc...
- h. Where (location) available for pick up and when (Specify The Date/Time/Group i.e. DTG) in GMT
- i. Is the shipper is willing to move the items to be shipped to the designated point of loading ?
- j. Specify any other special instructions
- k. Specify a telephone Point of Contact (POC), and if possible an alternative POC and the name of the person completing this questionnaire.



NOTE : It is important for that each one of the 11 lines of the above questionnaire be completed. Please indicate NO if the answer is negative.

1.9 The first NATO cargo flight departed from the Czech Republic on 11 September 2005 with 370 camp beds and 14 large tents; the flight is scheduled to arrive in Little Rock AFB, Arkansas on 12 September 2005 at 1930 UTC.

2. The US authorities greatly appreciate the support provided by the EAPC countries in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. However, the US authorities are now sufficiently advanced in their efforts to feed hurricane victims and they have confirmed that **no additional Meals Ready to Eat (MREs)** are required. In addition, there is no further need for foreign personnel support.
