


**1. Situation update:**

1.1 Torrential monsoon rains are still devastating Pakistan causing flooding where over 15,4 million people are affected and the numbers continue to raise. 1402 deaths were officially reported and almost 900 000 houses were damaged or destroyed. According to UN OCHA, assessments to establish the degree to which the affected population is in need of immediate humanitarian assistance continue.

1.2 Flood waters continue to swell in Sindh and Balochistan causing that additional needs are anticipated in both provinces. Evacuation of population residing in vulnerable areas is underway (Jaffarabad in Balochistan and Jacobabad in Sindh). Ongoing bad weather is still hampering rescues and relief operations. In addition to the weather, mudslides in the Northern areas have created catchments of water which could have further flooding complications and make access by land difficult. The second wave of flooding is currently moving through Punjab and Sindh Provinces and is assessed to have devastating effects on homes, livestock and crops.

1.3 Many people have yet to be reached with assistance they need. Clashes with police are reported (Sukkur district of Sindh). The support of the international donor community is essential if the response is to reach the necessary level, particularly in Sindh and Punjab.

1.4 Cases of cholera have been reported although unconfirmed by official sources. Rates of diarrheal disease continue to increase in affected areas; ensuring access to clean water is a top priority.

## 2. Transportation information

2.1 Nations and International Organisations are herewith invited to inform the EADRCC about possible national / organisational donations that require transportation and that are in accordance with the needs of Pakistan stated below. This information is urgently needed in order to prepare options for the transportation of relief goods to Pakistan. The transport requirements (commodity, volume and weight) should be sent to the EADRCC without any delay.

2.2 **Canada** is exploring options to meet Pakistan's stated requirements and could come back with a request for transport assistance.

## 3. The following requirements for international assistance have been identified:

### 3.1 The top priorities defined by Pakistani authorities are:

3.1.1 Providing immediate shelter (tents), i.e. rescue and relief from the elements;

3.1.2 Getting food (halal) to those affected (donors should provide a proof of food being halal);

3.1.3 Treating immediate medical problems such as diarrhea, cholera and begin prevention of health issues associated with flooding, such as skin, malaria and respiratory ailments;

3.1.4 Water and sanitation in the form of water treatment plants, pumps, electric generators and kits for hygiene purposes.

## 4. International assistance:

The following nations offered / provided assistance:

4.1 **Austrian** offer of 96 boxes of NaDCC water purification tablets (960.000 tablets good to purify around 4,800.000 litres of turbid water) **was delivered it to Pakistan on 16 August 2010. The Second Austrian offer (below) is awaiting acceptance** by the Pakistani authorities. (Both offers were made through EC Civil Protection Mechanism)

- one Inter Agency Health Kit 2006 (Red Cross standard) for basic medical treatment of up to 10.000 persons for up to 3 month;
- 150 all weather tents (4 x4).

4.2 **Azerbaijan** will provide 1 million USD to Pakistan for overcoming consequences of the flood and to support suffering population.



4.3 **France** has offered a large package of relief items (70t) A fully charged cargo plane is scheduled to leave Paris on 18 August. The offer consist of 1150 plastic tarpaulins, 100 water cisterns, 11730 blankets, 9900 jerry cans with tap, 992 cooking kits, 37 water purification tablets boxes, 200 shelter boxes, 15 medical emergencies trunks, one cholera kit, 2 clinic tents, one water purification station, 60 family tents (10 persons each) and 100 plastic tarpaulins (4X6 m), 100 water cisterns. (offer was made through EC Civil Protection Mechanism).

4.4 **Slovakia** has offered 8 tons of humanitarian assistance consisting of tents, camp beds, water pumps, power generators, blankets, field eating dishes, water bottle, spoons, towels. Slovakia requested transportation support to Pakistan. (Slovakia agrees, if necessary, to transport this assistance to any European country within 48 hours for further transportation to Pakistan).

4.5 **Sweden** provided assistance (3 water purification units, 6000 bottles of purification liquid, tents, etc) that arrived in the night of 15 August to Multan. Members of the team are exploring alternative sites for installing the water purification units (originally planned for Muzaffargarh). (offer was made through EC Civil Protection Mechanism).

4.6 **United States** is offering 30 flying hours of C-17 aircraft dedicated for humanitarian support to Pakistan (from Heavy Airlift Wing, PAPA airport Hungary).

4.7 Based on the Council Decision and a request from the Government of Pakistan the NATO Civil Military Assessment and Liaison Team has been deployed to Pakistan. The team, consist of 6 persons, arrived in Pakistan on 16 August 2010.

4.8 The EU Monitoring and Information Center is deploying an expert team to Pakistan to facilitate coordination of European Union Member States assistance. The team (5 persons) will depart from Brussels on 19 August 2010.

4.9 Several countries are providing bilateral assistance namely: Afghanistan, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Kuwait, Luxembourg, Qatar, New Zealand, Norway, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, The Netherlands, Turkey, United Arab Emirates, United Kingdom and United States (for details see the attached table).

## 5. Response co-ordination.

5.1 With a view to providing a coordinated response to the stricken nation's requirements, nations in a position to meet these demands, in full or in part, are invited to reply to the Operational Point of Contact of the Stricken Nation, with an information copy to EADRCC, by any of the communication means listed above and below.
