

North Atlantic Cooperation Council in 1991

The North Atlantic Cooperation Council was created on the 20 December 1991, bringing together the (then) sixteen NATO member countries and nine countries of Central and Eastern Europe, including Russia. Following the dissolution of the USSR that took place on the same day, NACC participation was expanded to all the newly independent states that had formerly been part of the Soviet Union. With the exception of Georgia, which joined in April 1992, these states formally participated in the NACC for the first time in March 1992.
