

North Atlantic Treaty Organisation Library Collection Development Policy

The Collection Development Policy of the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation library is intended to guide librarians in developing a cohesive collection. It also serves to inform NATO Library users and the public concerning the interests and pursuits of the Library.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organisation Library's basic collection development policy uses the Library of Congress subject classification schedules and the Research Library Group's Conspectus terms to describe the depth and breadth of the Library's acquisitions.

1. Purpose of Policy

This collection development policy is intended to provide statements reflecting current information needs of NATO HQ. It is intended to guide selectors in choosing material for the collection and in planning and reviewing development of the collection; to inform NATO staff, external users, and other interested persons or institutions of the nature of the collection and the direction of its development. The policy statements are intended to define the scope of collection and to specify the degree of coverage for each area defined as being within scope.

2. Coordination

The NATO Library collection policy takes into account the libraries of :

- the Belgian Ministry of Defense,
- SHAPE,
- NC3A
- NATO Defence College
- Belgian universities
- the network of NATO depository libraries¹

as sources of books, journals, or other material in their prime collecting areas.

3. Currency

The interests of NATO HQ are subject to change, which must be reflected in the collection policy. The policy is not intended to be an unchanging law, but must adapt to the needs of the Library's clientele. Library staff involved in collection development must remain cognizant of the activities of the organization, reflecting them appropriately in collection development policy. Moreover, the

ability of the Library to provide good coverage in some areas may be limited by budgetary or staff considerations.

4. Consistency

Adjusting to changing needs does not mean that the collection development policy should become so fluid that no continuity is maintained. A study of the history of collection development at the NATO Library shows remarkable consistency. The core subjects (defense, diplomacy and political sciences) have been areas of concentration from the beginning of the Library.

5. Types of Material

The Library collects substantive information in assorted formats.

Dissertations.

Doctoral dissertations may be acquired when in scope. Any dissertation written within a NATO program is collected (NATO-EAPC Fellowship, Manfred Wörner Fellowship).

Government Documents.

Publications issued under the authority of governments whether national, international may be acquired when in scope.

Legal materials.

Most of the acquisitions of legal materials are made for the secretary general legal advisor. Therefore, the resources are kept within this office.

Machine-Readable Materials.

Databases requiring the use of electronic systems for processing and access are acquired for the collection. Selections are restricted to subject areas which the Library collects at the research or comprehensive levels.

Maps.

No maps are acquired. Bound atlases that may be needed for reference use are acquired and retained selectively.

Microforms.

No microform materials are acquired.

Newsletters.

Newsletters may be acquired for the collection if they are of substantial interest and if they are in a subject collected at the Comprehensive level.

Newspapers.

No daily information newspapers are acquired for the Library. However, a portion of the Library budget is used to purchase newspapers for a few individual areas and for the Press Office.

Online resources.

The library subscribes to databases of electronic resources.

Rare books.

Rare or historical books or magazines are not acquired as they do not fit within scope.

Reprints.

If they are substantive and within scope, they can be acquired.

6. Languages

Most of the resources are in English or French. Nevertheless, documents in other languages can be acquired when in scope.

Translations.

Translations from a foreign language into English or French can be acquired.

7. Exclusions.

Generally excluded from the collection are:

- Fiction
- Forms, form letters, etc.
- Radio and television scripts
- Audiovisual materials
- Language training resources

8. Format of Scope Statement

The basic statement of the collection policy is expressed in terms of subject fields as given in the Library of Congress classification schedules and is arranged by the classification numbers from the schedules. For each subject two codes are given to indicate the level of collecting intensity, achieved and intended, e.g.:

The five levels of collecting intensity are:

- Minimal level (code-Min): Collections that support minimal inquiries about this subject and include a very limited collection of general resources, including monographs and reference works. Periodicals directly dealing with this topic and in-depth electronic information resources are not collected.

The collection should be frequently and systematically reviewed for currency of information. Superseded editions and titles containing outdated information should be withdrawn. Classic or standard retrospective materials may be retained.

- Basic level (code-Basic): Collections that introduce and define a subject, indicate the varieties of information available elsewhere include:
 - A limited collection of general monographs and reference tools.
 - A limited collection of representative general periodicals.

The collection should be frequently and systematically reviewed for currency of information. Superseded editions and titles containing outdated information should be withdrawn. Classic or standard retrospective materials may be retained.

- Study level (code-Study): Collections that provide information about a subject in a systematic way, but at a level of less than research intensity include:
 - An extensive collection of general monographs and reference works and selected specialized monographs and reference works.
 - An extensive collection of general periodicals and a representative collection of specialized periodicals.

The collection should be systematically reviewed for currency of information and for assurance that essential and important information is retained, including significant numbers of retrospective materials.

- Research level (code-Res): Collections that contain the major published source materials required for doctoral study and independent research include:
 - A very extensive collection of general and specialized monographs and reference works.
 - A very extensive collection of general and specialized periodicals

- Extensive collections of appropriate materials in languages other than the two primary language of the organisation .
- Defined access to a very extensive collection of owned or remotely-accessed electronic resources, including bibliographic tools, texts, data sets, journals, etc.

Older material is retained and systematically preserved to serve the needs of historical research.

- Comprehensive level (code-Com): Collections in a specifically defined field of knowledge that strive to be exhaustive as far as is reasonably possible (i.e., "special collections"), in all applicable languages include:
 - Exhaustive collections of published materials.
 - Very extensive collections in all other pertinent formats.

Older material is retained and systematically preserved to serve the needs of historical research. A comprehensive level collection may serve as a national or international resource.
