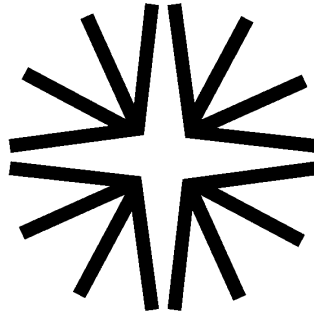

1. Situation update:

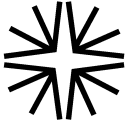
1.1 The number of people affected by the monsoon rains reaches 8.9 million in Sindh and Balochistan. Over 1.52 million houses were damaged during the floods. 6,791,067 acres of land have been affected by the floods. **Almost 1,000 schools have been damaged by the floods across the region.**

1.2 The death toll reaches 415 people.

1.3 UN launched the Rapid Response Plan which seeks to gather US\$357 million to support the Government of Pakistan in addressing emergency needs for up to 5.4 million people for six month. **So far, US\$79 million (22%) is funded of the required US\$357 million.**

1.4 **So far, approximately 1 million persons were provided with food, while 500,000 persons received essential medicines. Emergency shelter was provided to 320.000 persons. The provision of emergency shelter and water has reached 25% of the targeted population. Almost 600,000 persons have received water and more than 100,000 persons have been assisted with sanitation and hygiene.**

2. The ongoing joint UN-Government Detailed Needs assessment is expected to be completed shortly.

2.1 Access to affected areas is improving as the water is receding. Access to safe drinking water and sanitation facilities remains a critical issue in flood affected areas.

2.2 Needs for shelter, blankets and raised bedding are increasing with the onset of winter, the outbreak of water and vector borne diseases.

2.3 Three million flood-affected people remain highly vulnerable and in need of immediate food assistance in Sindh and Balochistan provinces.

3. Assistance provided through EU-Mechanism:

3.1. Austria offered assistance consisting of 3.010.000 “Aquatabs 167 mg” water purification tablets (each tablet to purify appr. 20 litres of water) and 300 winterized family tents (4x4 m UNHCR Specifications – good for a 5/6 persons family). The offer has been accepted by Pakistani Authorities. The tents were handed over on 30th September. **The tablets were delivered on 15 October 2011 in Karachi and have been handed over to Austrian NGO „Hilfswerk Austria“.**

3.2. France has offered jerry cans, water tanks, kitchen utensils and 1.2 tonnes of pharmaceuticals. The offer was accepted by Pakistan and was delivered on 25 September 2011.

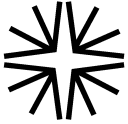
3.3. Slovak Republic offered humanitarian aid consisting of 5 tents, 1000 blankets, 98 jerry cans. The total value of the aid is 66.600 EUR. The offer was accepted by Pakistan. It will be delivered to the Port Qasim Karachi on 11 November 2011.

4. Assistance provided by EAPC nations:

4.1 The United States Agency of International Development has contributed \$100,000 for non food items, water, sanitation, and hygiene activities (WASH) – specifically plastic sheets, rope, Aquatabs and jerry cans on bilateral basis. In September, United States has provided a broad range of assistance to Sindh communities affected by floods, including food supplies for more than 50,000 families, and safe drinking water, shelter, sanitation and hygiene supplies, and basic health care for thousands more. USAID-funded food packages were provided to 23,000 families in seven districts of Sindh (Badin, Mirpurkas, Tando Muhammed Khan, Tando Allah Ya, Tharparker, Umarnkot, and Hyderabad). This assistance was delivered by the International Organization for Migration. USAID also paid for nearly 60 trucks to deliver relief to affected areas and 1,000 plastic tarpaulins for shelter, and is financing other efforts to coordinate relief activities.

4.2 Norway is supporting the Red Cross and other relief organisations with 5.2 million euro.

4.3 Turkey provided 12 tonnes medicine and medical consumables, 250 pcs of tents weighted at 21.5 tonnes, 1000 pcs of food packages weighted at 54 tonnes. The total



value of the humanitarian aid is US\$ 560.000. The aid **was** sent by a Turkish Airlines Cargo Plane. The humanitarian assistance arrived on 23 September 2011.

4.4 EMERCOM (Russian Federation) airlifted 71 MT of relief items listed below to the Karachi city by two flights of IL-76 aircraft on 6 October 2011 and 11 October 2011:

1. winter frame-tents “Pamir-10” – 280 kits;
2. blankets – 2800 pcs;
3. pumping equipment – 10 units;
4. water purification equipment – 10 units;
5. ground rice – 10 MT;
6. sugar – 10 MT;
7. canned fish – 9,3 MT.

The overall estimated value of the Russian emergency humanitarian operation is about USD 1.5 million.

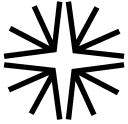
6. Delivery point:
