The self-defence capability that Japan is allowed to have is limited to the minimum set out by the limitations of article 9 of the post-Second World War Japanese Constitution. However, Japan's enhanced security activity over the last decade demonstrates that it is seeking to abandon such self-imposed constraints on its exercise of military power. With changes in international circumstances and the Asia-Pacific security environment, Japan quickens the pace on its path to becoming a relevant political and military actor. North Korea and China have emerged as 'areas of concern' for Japan. To counter the threat of a limited strike from North Korea, Japan participates in American ballistic missile defence research and development. Three of the main areas of friction between China and Japan are the Yasukuni Shrine, the history text books and the Taiwan issue. The new Defence guidelines direct Japan towards a more flexible and mobile structure of the self-defence forces that can be used to support US-led expeditionary operations. The strengthened Japan-US security arrangements are an indispensable part of Japan's security policy. Revision of the Constitution in the near future is likely, especially with a view to the right of collective self-defence.
